ENQUIRIES, REGISTRATION AND ENTRY PROCEDURE

REGISTRATION

Application for admission should be made to the Registrar. A Registration Form is enclosed with this information. A request may be made for a pupil to go to a particular House and be placed on the House List as soon as possible and this will be confirmed on receipt of the Acceptance Form and Deposit. It is expected that parents will bring their son or daughter to meet the Head and Housemaster/Housemistress before entry to the school.

A non-returnable Registration Fee of £100 is payable by all on Registration.

ENTRY AT 13

Pupils are usually admitted between their thirteenth and fourteenth birthdays.

A pupil may qualify for admission to the school by a satisfactory performance in the Common Entrance Examination or our own examination for pupils who have not been prepared for Common Entrance. Entry can also be achieved through Scholarship Examinations, details of which can be found on Page 13.

PRE-SIXTH FORM ENTRY

Each year we admit approximately thirty 15 year-old pupils onto our Pre-Sixth Form course. The course is intended to prepare pupils for sixth form study in either A levels or the International Baccalaureate. Most students will take some GCSE examinations (up to six) depending on their progress through the year. Please call for further details.

SIXTH FORM ENTRY

Each September approximately 70 students are admitted into the Lower Sixth to begin two-year A Level or International Baccalaureate Diploma courses.

In order to gain a place in the Sixth Form, pupils are expected to gain six GCSE passes which must include English and Mathematics together with good grades in the subjects they wish to take at A/Higher Level and we like to test or interview them in their A/Higher Level subjects. Sixth Form Scholarships and Exhibitions are also available, details of which can be found on Page 13.

CONFIRMATION OF ENTRY

An Acceptance Deposit is payable upon Registration or twenty months before the beginning of the school year (September) in which a pupil is due to be admitted, whichever is the later.

The Acceptance Deposit is not normally refunded if a pupil does not take up the place that has been allocated unless this is due to failure to pass the entrance examination. In the case of pupils who are admitted, it is refunded as a deduction from their final account after they have left the School. It thus serves during a pupil's career in the school as a deposit against the payment of those charges which are made in arrears.

3. Fees (Payable in advance per term. Fees for the school year are, for convenience, divided into three equal parts irrespective of the relevant lengths of the three terms. The obligation of the parent to pay the full fees, including the boarding element for the pupil's last term, continues notwithstanding that the pupil may leave the school on completion of his or her public examinations.)

 - Ex-Malvern College Prep School Boarders* £9,052.00
 - Sixth Form Boarders (new entrants; applicable for both 6th form years) £9,658.00
 - Day pupils £6,185.00
 - Ex-Malvern College Prep School Day Pupils* £5,998.00

(A pupil is eligible for the ex-Malvern College Prep School reduced fee if they have attended the Prep School for a minimum of two full years immediately prior to transferring to the College.)*

SCHOLARSHIPS AND AWARDS

16+ SCHOLARSHIPS

A small number of Sixth Form scholarships will be available this year. These awards are based on the financial circumstances of the family. Further details may be obtained from the Registrar.

13+ SCHOLARSHIPS

Scholarships and Exhibitions are offered for competition this year in our Scholarship Examination which is held at the school. Candidates for all Scholarships must be under 14 years of age on 1st September in the year of the examination, but there is no age limit for Exhibitions. Entries must be received three weeks before the examination. Entry forms are available from the Registrar or Preparatory Schools at the beginning of December.

The following awards are offered for entries in September 2010:

Academic Awards 22nd - 24th February
Up to twenty academic awards are offered through the Common Academic Scholarship.

Music Scholarships 1st - 3rd February
Candidates should have reached the equivalent of a good Grade 5 in at least one instrument or singing. Awards are made by audition and interview.

Art Scholarships 17th January
The examination consists of two practical tests and an interview. Candidates must also bring a portfolio of their work.

Drama Scholarships 17th January
Candidates should be able to demonstrate a strong interest in and talent for Drama. The award will be decided by an audition and interview.

Design & Technology Scholarships 17th January
The award will be decided by work carried out prior to the examination, a practical examination and an interview.

The Music, Art, Drama and Technology Awards are conditional upon candidates passing the Common Entrance or being exempted from it as a result of the College's Academic Scholarship Examination.

Malvernian Society Awards 22rd April
These awards are for candidates who have strong interests outside the classroom and a proven record of performance in them. They must also perform well at interview and show academic potential.

Malvernian Society Junior Levick Sports Awards
12th November - Boys
19th November - Girls
This award is for candidates who have a proven record of performance, or evidence of potential in sport, at county, regional or national level, ideally in two or more Malvern College Priority Sports*, although other sports are considered.

* Malvern College Priority Sports are as follows:
BOYS: Cricket, Football, Hockey, Rugby, Tennis

GIRLS: Athletics, Hockey, Netball, Tennis

CAREERS AND HIGHER EDUCATION

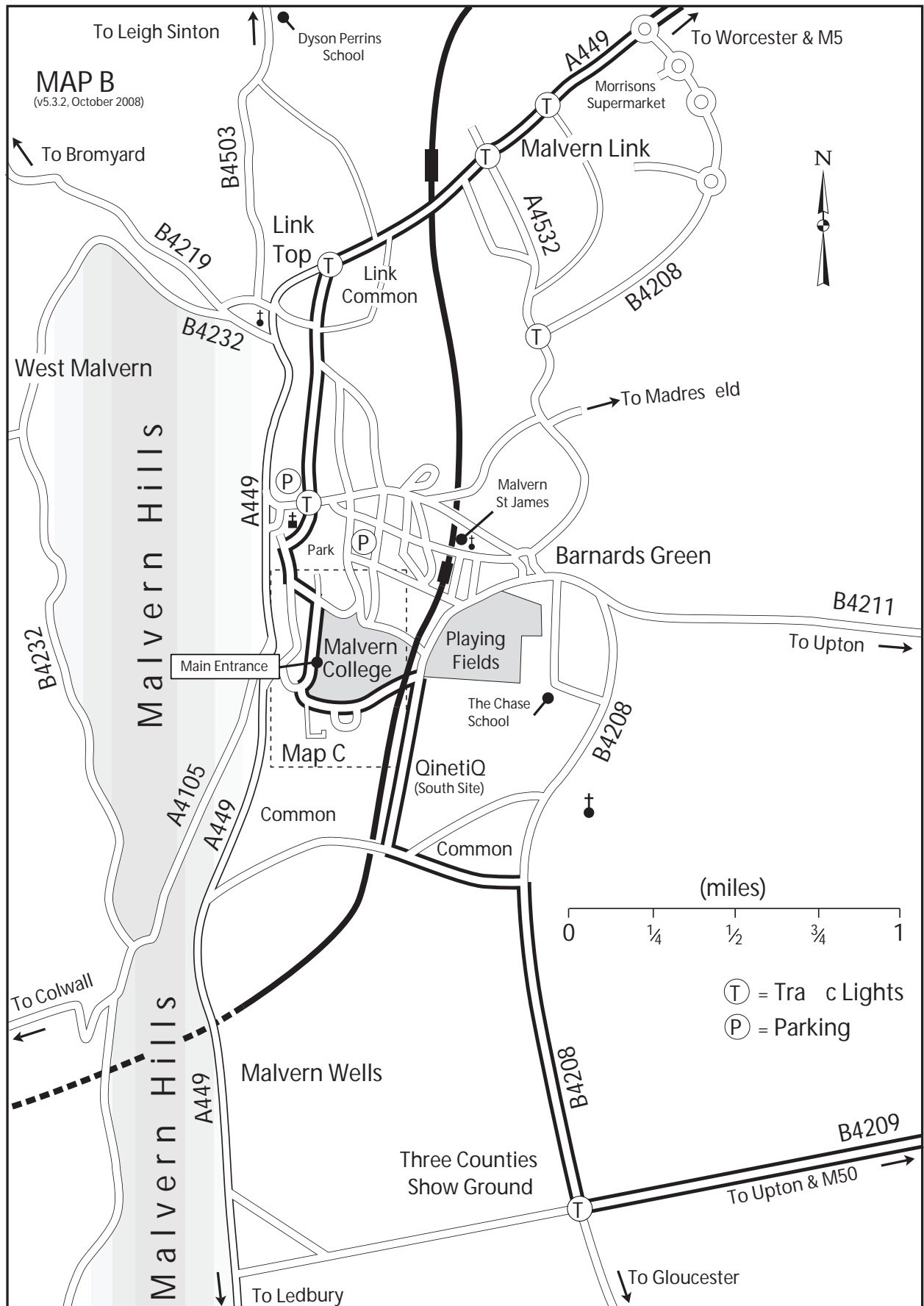
In the lower years pupils are encouraged to investigate the world of work with their tutors, using information provided by the Careers Department. All pupils in the Hundred (Year 11) and all new pupils entering the school in the Lower Sixth (Year 12) take the Independent Schools' Careers Organisation Morrisby Profiling tests. These tests are followed by an in-depth interview with a qualified Careers Advisor and the resulting Careers Guidance Report provides a clear picture of a pupil's strengths, aptitudes and interests. Pupils are then in an informed position to make sensible decisions about AS/A2 Level and IB subject choices for higher education and careers.

Lower Sixth pupils are strongly encouraged to spend one week of their holidays on Work Experience placements closely linked to their own interests and possible future career paths. This enables pupils to gain invaluable first-hand experience of the world of work and provides an important link between the careers information and advice given in the Lower School and the exploration of and application to Higher Education which forms the main focus in the Sixth Form.

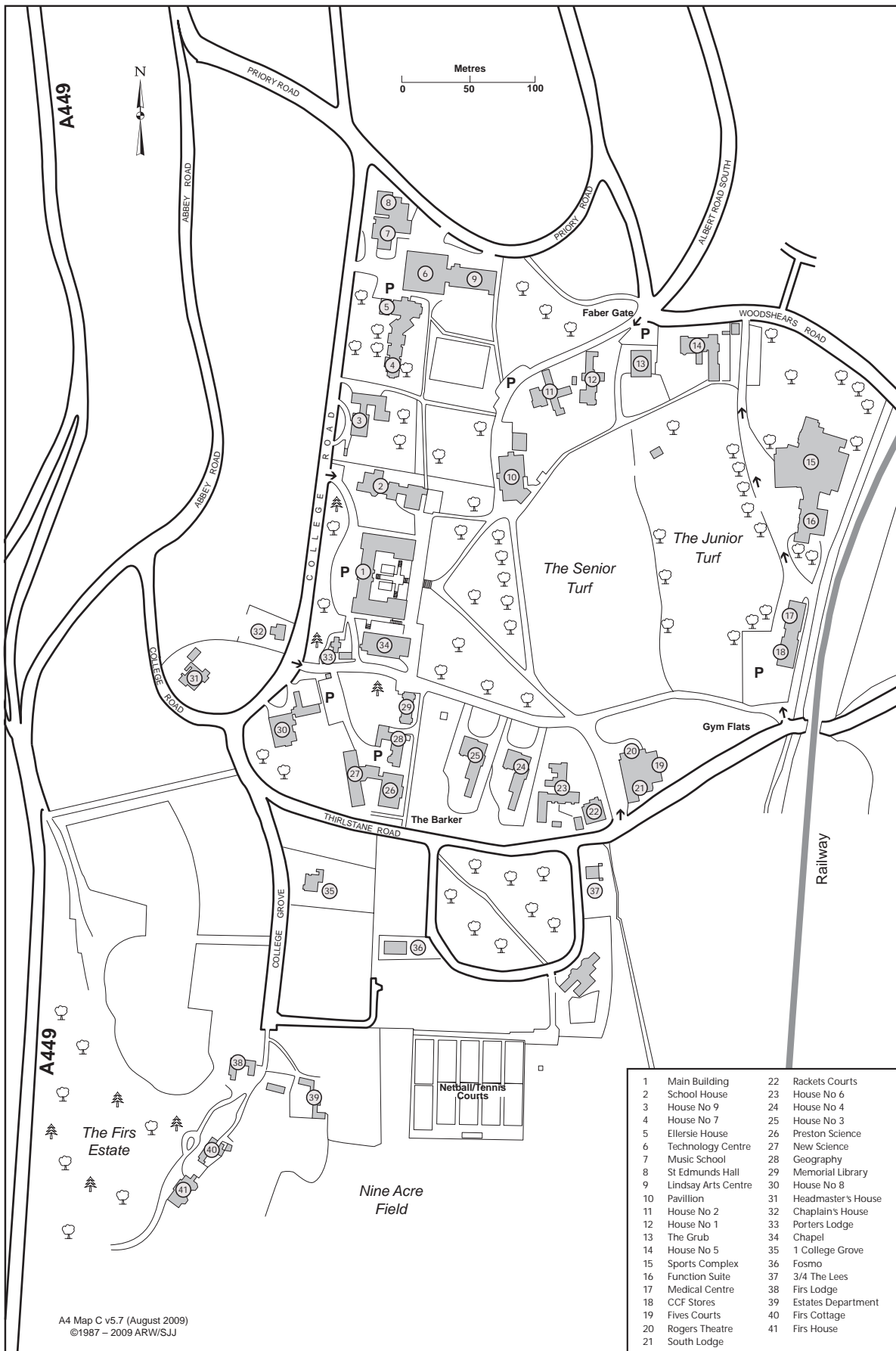
The vast majority of pupils from the College go on to study at university, either directly from school or following a Gap Year. In most years around 12 pupils gain Oxbridge places. Pupils are encouraged to visit universities and to attend Higher Education fairs. They can gather information using the extensive Careers Library with its large collection of prospectuses and other publications, CD-ROMs and access to the internet. Advice is given about university entrance procedures, interview techniques and the variety of Gap Year schemes available. Parents are, of course, kept informed and involved throughout a pupil's time at Malvern.

At all stages, the aim of the Careers and Higher Education Department is to help pupils make informed and sensible decisions about their future.
